An average Feast of Sharing dinner serves 3,000 pounds of sliced turkey, 2,500 pounds of cornbread dressing, 750 pumpkin pies, 380 gallons of mashed potatoes, 140 gallons of turkey gravy. It happens once a year during thanksgiving. It is held at the Fair park for maximum capacity. Various organizations all come to together to make this a big event. There are many vendors, there are many arts, many giveaways, and a lot of entertainments that all goes into that 4 hours of serving.

There are so many areas that volunteers are needed. There were vendors who needed assistance in arranging their things. There was also a need for volunteers to usher people in at all the entrances into the building. More volunteers were needed to take care of the dishes and cutleries all needed for the feast. We also had to work with the security department to keep count of how many wheelchairs went in and how many were coming back out. The wheelchairs were all donated by a separate organization, this was one good example of the networking aspect of this event.


